Globalisation and liberalisation represent a fundamental shift in the development strategy of the Indian economy. Liberalisation refers to the relaxation of government controls and regulations, while globalisation denotes the increasing integration of the Indian economy with the rest of the world through trade, investment, technology and capital flows. Together, these processes have transformed India's economic structure and policy framework since the early 1990s.

The reform process has contributed to higher economic growth, expansion of international trade, increased foreign direct investment and rapid growth of the service sector.

Liberalisation of industrial and trade policies has enhanced competition, improved efficiency and encouraged technological upgradation. Globalisation has facilitated access to global markets, improved productivity in several sectors and strengthened India's position in global value chains, particularly in information technology, pharmaceuticals, business services and manufacturing.

Despite these positive outcomes, the impact of globalisation and liberalisation has been uneven across regions, sectors and social groups. While urban and skill-intensive sectors have benefited substantially, concerns remain regarding employment generation, informalisation of labour, agrarian distress and widening income and regional inequalities. Small and medium enterprises and traditional industries have faced increased competitive pressures, raising questions about inclusive growth and social equity.

Globalisation has also altered the nature of employment, with a shift towards contract-based and informal work arrangements. The declining share of organised employment, challenges in labour absorption and disparities in wage growth have emerged as important policy concerns. At the same time, exposure to global economic fluctuations has increased India's vulnerability to external shocks, including financial crises, trade disruptions and changes in global demand.

The proposed seminar seeks to provide a comprehensive academic platform to critically examine the impact of globalisation and liberalisation on the Indian economy. Through scholarly deliberations, empirical research and policy-oriented discussions, the seminar aims to explore strategies that balance economic growth with employment generation, social equity and long-term sustainability.
